Washington Legislative Update July 31, 2012



- A. What is the Fiscal Cliff?
 - 1. Expiration of the 2001 & 2003 tax cuts
 - 2. Implementation of \$1.2 Trillion, 10-year sequestration of domestic & defense discretionary programs
 - 3. U.S. reaches ceiling on the National Debt
- B. Will hit around the end of 2012
- C. Resolution dependent on November election results

II. Fiscal Year 2013 Appropriations



- A. House has passed 6 of 12 bills; Senate none
- B. House spending ceiling of \$1.028 Trillion vs.
 Senate ceiling of \$1.047 Trillion = \$19 billion disagreement on total FY 13 funding levels
- C. Resolution of impasse also dependent on November election results




III. Washington Meetings on Orange County Priorities and FY 2013 Appropriations



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A. Office of Management & Budget (OMB)

- Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works signed off on \$7.2 Million request for Santa Ana River Mainstem Project for FY 13
- 2. OMB will review Corps funding capability as part of FY 13 workplan after Congress finalizes 2013 appropriations bills



III. Washington Meetings on Orange County Priorities and FY 2013 Appropriations



- B. Westminster-East Garden Grove & San Juan Creek projects
 - 1. New Corps 3-3-3 program to finalize or eliminate backlog of feasibility studies
 - 2. Los Angeles District will work with Orange County to try to move along two backlogged projects





III. Washington Meetings on Orange County Priorities and FY 2013 Appropriations



- C. Senate Appropriations Committee
 - Staff concerned about the low level of funding for construction in House FY 13 energy & water appropriations bill
- D. House Budget Committee to tackle block grant funding for Medi-Cal and other programs next year as part of FY 2014 budget
 - Congressman Calvert aware of need to protect local jurisdictions in any block grant proposals

IV. Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA)



- A. Supreme Court decision hands future of Affordable Care Act back to Congress
 - House vote on July 11 was thirty-third time it has voted to repeal ACA since Republicans regained control last year
 - 2. Senate Republicans vow to use budget reconciliation to repeal ACA if they take control of Chamber in 2013 (51 votes required under reconciliation rather than 60)
 - 3. Republican President, as well as Congress, required for outright repeal

IV. Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA)



B. As of mid-July, 12 States—including California have committed to setting up insurance exchanges under ACA

C. Expansion of Medicaid (Medi-Cal) now voluntary as result of Supreme Court decision; ten states have accepted, five have rejected expansion
