
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



Children's Demographics Total Population: 882,644





Quick Facts on the Impact of Dropouts


- ➤ Nationwide, 7,000 students drop out of school EACH DAY
- ➤ Nationwide, about 70% of students graduate from high school with a standard diploma
- ➤59% of federal prison inmates and 75% of America's state prisoners are dropouts
- ➤ A dropout earns \$260,000 less over a lifetime than a high school graduate

One-Year and Four-Year Derived High School Dropout Rates* for Orange County and California, 1998/99 to 2007/08







THE GOOD NEWS

There has been an increase in families' ability to Access Health Care (pg. 38).

88% of mothers received Early Prenatal Care (pg. 40).

NEEDS IMPROVEMENT

The percentage of births with **Low Birth Weight** increased to 6.4% (pg. 44).

Children are unable to meet the minimum fitness standards in all six areas of the **Physical Fitness Test** (pg. 54)

The percentage of **Overweight Children** continues to increase (pg. 56).

THE GOOD NEWS

There was a 6.2% increase in the number of Participants served by Women Infants and Children (WIC) since 1999/00 (pg. 76).

NEEDS IMPROVEMENT

- There was a 15% increase in the total number of students receiving **Free and Reduced Lunch** between 2000/01 and 2009/10 (183,524 to 227,820) (pg. 74).
- The proportion of the total students receiving **Free and Reduced Lunch** has reached a high of 44% (pg. 74).



Educational Achievement 2009/10 Public School Enrollment 497,291


THE GOOD NEWS

Monthly average number of **Dependent Children** decreased by 31% from 1999/00 to 2008/09 (pg. 116).

NEEDS IMPROVEMENT

The number of **Gang Members** ages 8 to 17 increased by 60.5% from 1,153 in 2000, to 1,851 in 2009 (pg. 128).
