

Children's Demographics Total Population: 846,604




AGE DISTRIBUTION

Substance Exposed Babies

Maternal use of Alcohol, Tobacco, and/or Other Drug (ATOD) during pregnancy increases risk of:


▶ Developmental, physical, behavioral, and social disabilities.

Prevalence of ATOD Use During Pregnancy in Orange County:

- Two-phased assessment completed April and May 2007
- Urinalysis of women giving birth
- Self-report surveys
- ➤ Nearly 2,600 pregnant women participated

Substance Exposed Babies Prevalence Rates in Orange County

Self-Reported Prevalence of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Other Drug Use (ATOD)



All Substances

The countywide prevalence rate of women who reportedly used:

31.5% used at least one substance the month before pregnancy.

15.1% used at least one substance at any time during pregnancy.

8.9% indicated that they used a substance in their **most recent month of pregnancy.**



Substance Exposed Babies Conclusions

- Most common illicit drugs detected in urinalysis: Opiates, amphetamines, and marijuana.
- Most likely to use ATOD: Non-Hispanic white women and women with higher education.
- Regions that showed higher rates of ATOD: West and South.
- Substance users were more likely to have:
 - Family member with a substance use problem.
 - Initiated prenatal care later or received no prenatal care.
 - Been exposed to second-hand smoke during pregnancy.
 - Babies born with shorter gestational age and lower birth weight.



Good Health

THE GOOD NEWS

- There has been an increase in families' ability to Access Health Care (pg 38).
- > 91% of mothers received Early Prenatal Care.
- Increase in Children and Youth Services (CYS), Mental Health Services (pg. 62).


NEEDS IMPROVEMENT

- Children's inability to meet the minimum fitness standards in all six areas of the Physical Fitness Test (pg. 54).
- Percentage of Overweight Children (pg. 56).
- Currently, about one out of five children lack Adequate Immunizations by age two (pg. 50).

- Decrease in the number of children receiving financial assistance through CalWORKs (pg. 72).


NEEDS IMPROVEMENT

- Increase in the total number of students receiving Free and Reduced Lunch (FRL) (pg. 74).
- Proportion of students receiving FRL as a percent of the total enrollment increased (pg.74).
- Increase in the number of participants served by Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (pg. 76).
- Average Cost of Early Care and Education in child care centers increased 58% (pg. 82).

THE GOOD NEWS

- ➤ The Academic Performance Index (API) scores increased (pg. 90).
- ➤In 2007, approximately 51% of Orange County schools made the API statewide target of 800 (pg. 90).

- The **Total Public School Enrollment** declined from the high of 515,464 in 2003/04 (pg. 88).
- ➤Increase in number of **English Learners** students (pg. 94).
- ➤ The Average per Pupil Expenditure for grades K-12 (pg. 96):

Orange County: \$8,008

California: \$9,156

United States: \$10,212

THE GOOD NEWS

- ➤ Monthly average number of **Dependent Children** decreased by 25% from 1997/98 to 2006/07 (pg. 116).
- ➤ Children in Out-of-Home Care decreased 26% (pg. 116).
- ➤ Children placed with a **Relative** increased 25% (pg. 118).
- ➤ Children placed in **Group Homes** decreased 65% (pg.118).


NEEDS IMPROVEMENT

- Number of **Gang Members** has been increasing steadily since a low in 2002 (pg 128).
- ➤ Number of **Gang Members** increased by 46.6% from 2006 to 2007 (pg.128).
- ➤ Number of Juvenile Arrests increased from 2005 to 2006 (pg. 124).

Average Monthly Number of Children in Out-of-Home Care and the Average Monthly Number of Dependents of the Court, 1997/98 to 2006/07



Total Juvenile Arrests for Youth 10 to 17 Years of Age, 1997 to 2006






Gang Membership
