BILL CAMPBELL

Bill Campbell was first elected to the Orange County Board of Supervisors, Third District, in January 2003 with an overwhelming margin of victory, nearly 75 percent of the vote. After serving the remainder of a vacated term, he was elected to his first, full term in March 2004 and a second term in June 2008. The Third District includes the cities of Anaheim, Brea, Irvine, Orange, Tustin, Villa Park, and Yorba Linda, as well as the unincorporated areas of North Tustin, Orange Park Acres and Orange County's canyon communities.

Born in Los Angeles and raised in nearby Pico Rivera, Supervisor Campbell is a proud southern Californian. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in electrical engineering from Loyola Marymount University, and he holds a Master of Business Administration degree from the Harvard Business School.

Supervisor Campbell is a member of the Orange County chapter of Legatus, a Catholic organization for business professionals. He is a former member of the Young Presidents' Organization, where he served on the International Board of Directors. He is also a member of the alumni associations of both of his almae matres and has served on the Board of Directors of the Loyola Alumni Association.

Supervisor Campbell served in the California Legislature as an Assembly Member from 1996 to 2002. He served as Assembly Minority Leader, Vice Chairman of the prestigious Committee on Appropriations and was a member of the Banking and Finance Committee, the Education Committee, and the Utilities and Commerce Committee.

While in the California State Assembly and as a member of the Orange County Board of Supervisors, Supervisor Campbell worked to enhance the quality of life for the residents of Orange County through the preservation and development of recreational, cultural, educational and historical assets that will be a legacy left to future generations. He has sought to protect Orange County's natural resources through proposals such as Assembly Bill 1969 which protected Orange County's coastal resources by requiring an increased standard of treatment for wastewater.

Supervisor Campbell was first elected Chairman of the Board of Supervisors by his colleagues in January 2005 and his second term as Chairman of the Board in January 2006. He was most recently elected Chairman of the Board of Supervisors by his colleagues in January 2011.

In addition to his duties at the County's Hall of Administration, he is Chairman of the Orange County Children and Family Commission, and serves as a member of the Orange County Transportation Authority, the In-Home Supportive Services Public Authority, the Library Advisory Board, the Orange County Housing Authority, the South Orange County Public Financing Authority, the Santa Ana River Trail and Parkway Advisory Group, the North Oversight Committee, the Emergency Management Council, the One Water, One Watershed Steering Committee, the Orange County Operational Area Executive Board, the Southern California Water Committee, and the San Joaquin and Foothill/Eastern Transportation Corridor agencies. Additionally, he is an alternate member of the Santa Ana River Flood Protection Agency, the Orange County Fire Authority, and the Orange County Local Agency Formation Commission.

Supervisor Campbell and his wife, Mary, reside in Villa Park, where they have lived for over 35 years. They have three grown sons, Patrick, Chris and Brian, and four grandchildren. Prior to his service in elected office, he was a successful businessman most recently in the fast food business and earlier in his career in the aerospace industry.

Ed is the co-anchor and managing editor of KOCE-TV's nightly news magazine show, "Real Orange," and the announcer for Dr. Robert H. Schuller's internationally syndicated "Hour of Power." He joined KOCE-TV in January 2000 after over thirty years as a sportscaster/anchor in Los Angeles. Ed has been the volunteer on-air announcer for the "Hour of Power" since the Crystal Cathedral began broadcasting their worship services in 1970.

As sports anchor for KTLA-TV and KABC-TV, Ed Arnold interviewed and reported on famous high-visibility and high-performance athletes. Interestingly enough, those very words describe Ed Arnold. He has a proven track record in broadcasting and a trusted presence in the community. Ed is very involved with civic organizations, youth groups, and various charities. For his work as a journalist and his community involvement Ed was given the 2007 "Lifetime Achievement Award" by the Southern California Radio and TV News Association.

The Emmy and Golden Mike Award winner began his broadcasting career at the age of 14 in his hometown of Texarkana, Arkansas. During this same period, he was a sports personality for radio stations KRLA, KHTZ, and in 1986 and 1987, for KMPC. In mid-1986, Ed Arnold returned to KTLA where he remained until July 1, 1999.

Ed Arnold is extremely involved in his community. In 1968 Arnold was a founding board member of the California Special Olympics and still plays an active role in the organization's events and also serves on the Board of Governors for the Special Olympics Southern California who honored Ed with the inaugural "Rafer Johnson Humanitarian Award" in 2010. In 1975, he was selected as one of California's Five Outstanding Young Men. Ed was elected 46th president of the California Jaycees and selected by his peers as a Jaycee International Senator. He served on the board of directors of the March of Dimes for thirty-five years, is a founding board member of the Orange County Sports Hall of Fame, served on the Salvation Army's Orange County advisory board for ten years, and has volunteered for Olive Crest since 1974. Ed served seven terms as president of the Orange County Multiple Sclerosis Society and five terms as president of the Southern California Cystic Fibrosis Foundation where he still serves as a vice-president. Arnold was charter president of the Rotary Club of Fountain Valley, and for two terms was president of the Southern California Sports Broadcaster's Association. He is a member of the Santa Ana College Foundation Board of Directors. Ed has served for many years as the Southern California radio-tv representative for the John Wooden Award that honors the top collegiate basketball player in the nation. He is a member of the Friends of the Santa Ana Zoo, Surfrider Foundation, Friends of the Fountain Valley Library, the Vince Ferragamo Foundation, the USMC Memorial committee, the Marine Corps League, among others and is a lifetime member of the International Surfing Museum.

The Ed Arnold Foundation saluted Ed with their "Sports Humanitarian," and "Volunteer of the Year" awards. The Ed Arnold Foundation presented him with their "Walter Knott Award". The National Multiple Sclerosis Society presented the "Hope Award" to Ed, and the Boys and Girls Clubs presented him their "Golden Eagle" Award and "Service to Youth Award" for over 40 years of devoted service. The largest annual Huntington Beach Boys' and Girls' Club fundraiser is named the "Ed Arnold Annual Boys' and Girls' Club Benefit Dinner". The Orange County Boys and Girls Clubs present their top volunteer with the "Eddy Award" named

Ed was named the honorary Mayor for the city of Buena Park and the city of Palm Desert.

Ed Arnold, Texarkana, Arkansas High School, Santa Ana College and California State University Long Beach, awarded Ed with the "Distinguished Alumni" award. Santa Ana College also named their annual Hall of Fame golf tournament the "Ed Arnold Golf Classic". He was inducted into the Santa Ana College Athletic Hall of Fame and the Santa Ana College Hall of Fame in 2009 and in 2011 Ed was inducted into the Vanguard University of Southern California Hall of Fame.

In 1987, 1996, and 1999 the Southern California Sports Broadcasters Association named Stu Nahan and Ed Arnold "Sports Anchor Staff" for their work at KTLA.

Ed Arnold has appeared in such movies as "The Final Shot: The Hank Gathers Story" and "McNaughton's Confession". He also appeared on "The Steve Allen Show", "Get Christy Love", "Dick Clark's Bloopers and Practical Jokes", "Television Theatre", "No Soap Radio" and "Good Morning America" among others.
